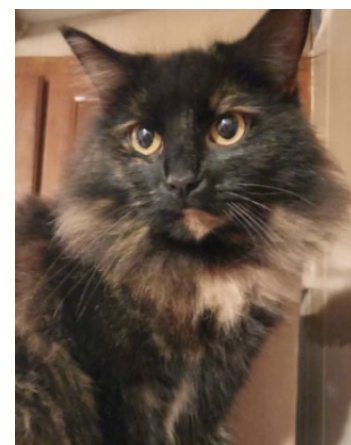

HPAN's Sponsorship of \$2,165 Helped Over 13 Dogs Rescued by Almost Home Animal Rescue

Funds provided by HPAN paid for vet bills that covered exams, vaccines, deworming, spaying/neutering, parasite testing, etc. Some of the dogs needed medicine and/or additional services. Rescue Spotlight 🐾

MoCo Mutts Rescue Center

What are your thoughts when you hear the words, “animal shelter”? Do you think of a county or city establishment where unwanted or stray animals go? Do you ever wonder what happens to those animals when there is no county or city shelter? Do the strays wander around trying to survive until someone saves them, or until the inevitable happens? Do the unwanted ones end up in a dump and run situation? There are several rural counties in Tennessee with no animal shelter, no animal control, and no hope for the strays and unwanted ones. Morgan County was one of them until the Senior Dog Lodge and Animal Rescue (SDL) came to town.



Lisa and Jeff Hill relocated to Sunbright, TN from Seattle, WA during the summer of 2018. They had established SDL as a non-profit organization in Seattle with the mission of taking senior dogs in need of sanctuary care. That was to be their mission in Sunbright as well; however, it did not take long for Lisa and Jeff to realize a greater need, and soon they found themselves taking in dogs of all ages - some with illness or injury - and cats, too. That first year, they took in 425 animals off the streets of Morgan County, in addition to owner surrenders. They built kennels and dog runs on their own property and funded the entire operation from their own finances. Vaccines, dewormer, heartworm tests, surgeries, food, etc. cost them nearly \$15,000 that year. Not to mention the agony of not having a facility. Winters were especially hard caring for the animals in frigid temperatures. Fortunately, relationships built with other area rescue partners enabled SDL to quickly move many of the animals where they had better adoption opportunities.

Fast forward to 2020, after being in Tennessee for two years, the intake numbers climbed to 760 animals, even amid a pandemic. Community support increased and the rescue garnered \$4,000 in county support for Sheriff Department-assists on animal welfare calls. Unfortunately, the county money was gone in two months for vet bills associated with those calls.

In 2021, thanks to community and fan support, SDL was able to procure a facility not far from the SDL location. They created a subsidiary rescue under SDL, called MoCo Mutts Rescue Center (pictured). The facility had its grand opening in April. It was a glorious day with amazing community support. The county sheriff, county executive, and even a state senator showed up to support.

MoCo Mutts has already taken in over 600 animals so far this year (January-June), and they always have around 85 dogs and 45 cats in their care. The busiest month was June when the rescue center took in 125 dogs and 90 cats. The intake never stops; the door revolves continuously. They need help – volunteers and money. Annual building costs are \$30,000, not to mention vet bills and food. The county commission approved an additional \$1,000 for FY22 for sheriff-assisted calls. Not nearly enough. Baby steps...

Resolve is one thing Lisa, Jeff, and the VP of SDL, Tracy Wyant, have. They resolve to make a difference one day at a time...one animal at a time. They will do it with or without county support. In fact, both Lisa and Tracy work for free at the Rescue Center 14 hours per day, seven days per week. More volunteers are desperately needed. It is their hope and prayer that the community (both inside and outside of Morgan County) will come together for the sake of the discarded animals of the county so they can begin to live their BEST life at MoCo Mutts. 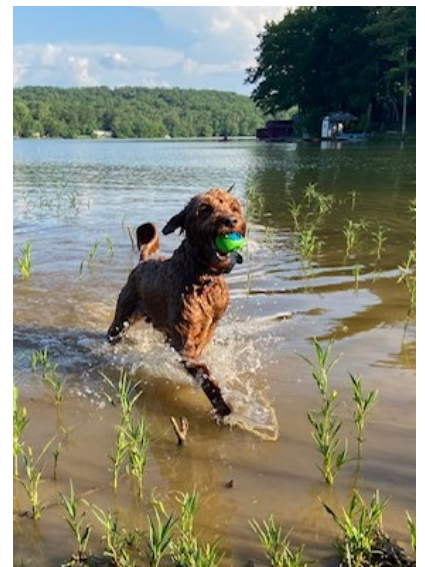

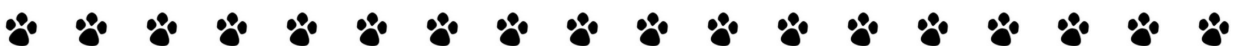
Lepto Vaccine for Dogs 🐾

If your dog enjoys swimming in lakes or drinking from puddles on long walks, it might be a good idea to ask your veterinarian if they recommend the Lepto vaccine for your pup! Leptospirosis is a disease that affects dogs and many other kinds of animals. Leptospirosis is caused by a spirochete bacteria. Dogs often contract the disease by swimming in stagnant water or drinking contaminated water in puddles. Pets can also become infected through contact with urine of infected animals (e.g., raccoons, skunks, feral cats, etc.).

More cases are usually diagnosed in late summer and fall and often after heavy rainfalls. Leptospira exists in mud, dampness, and standing water. The risk of contracting Leptospira is lower in the winter because the bacteria does not tolerate freezing temperatures.
