DIY Cat Shelters by Ashley Letson

Have you ever wondered how you can help community cats in your neighborhood during the colder months? Consider making some DIY winter cat shelters! These are fairly inexpensive and easy to make.

You will need the following:

- A larger plastic storage bin (about 30 gallon size)
- A smaller plastic storage bin (about 20 gallon size) to fit inside the larger one. Alternatively you could use a Styrofoam cooler.
- Straw (not hay)
- Box cutter

Steps:

1. Cut a hole about 5 ½ to 6 inches in diameter (a few inches up from the bottom) in each of the bins so that they line up with each other. TIP: the plastic is easier to cut if you heat it up with a hair dryer before cutting.

2. Put down a layer of straw in the bottom of the outer bin, then place the smaller one inside the larger one.

3. Stuff straw in the spaces between the bins for insulation. Put plenty of straw inside of the inner bin for bedding, and then put the lid on the smaller bin and spread some more straw over the top. Then place the lid on the outer bin.

4. Avoid placing the shelter directly on the cold ground. Raise it a couple inches off the ground using a wood pallet, bricks, or other material.

Some important things to keep in mind when constructing the shelter:



Start with a 30 gallon

tote for one to two cats

Add straw



Cut 5 1/2" diameter hole in tote



Add Styrofoam lid



Insert Styrofoam cooler and cut hole in Styrofoam to match tote



Add tote lid-finished!

• Strong insulation – needed to trap body heat. Always use straw! Not hay, blankets, or towels as those all retain moisture. They also absorb body heat and will make the cat colder.

• Minimal air space – a smaller interior area means that less heat is needed to keep the cats warm. Two small shelters are better than one large one.

• Have the entrance face a wall so that larger animals such as racoons cannot get in.

• Consider weighing the shelter down. It's easiest to just put a couple of bricks or a paver on the top.
